# ELECTION WINNERS TAKE Seats on Council



William Siegel

Toni Casey, Robert Johnson, and William Siegel have taken the seats on the City Council to which they were elected last April.

Traditionally the mayor pro tem has been elected to serve as the next mayor, but Siegel, who has served on the council since 1986 and was mayor pro tem, asked not to be considered for mayor for personal reasons.

Until the early 1980s, Los Altos Hills' mayors had generally served two-year terms, but one-year terms have become the recent pattern. When Siegel asked not to be considered for the position, the City Council unanimously re-elected Mayor Barbara Tryon until the first meeting in September, at which time the City Council will again consider the issue.

The City Council also unanimously elected Johnson mayor pro tem.

Tryon and Johnson had served together on the Safety Committee several years ago, and both said they look forward to working together again.

## Some Homes Have Ample Water, Others May Lose Landscaping

Drought has created a geographical split in Los Altos Hills, with people in the north facing a severe water shortage and those in the south only being asked to cut back a little bit.

Approximately two-thirds of the Town's homes face mandatory cutbacks in water usage of as much as 45 percent this summer. These are homes served by the Purissima Hills Water District, which is based in Los Altos Hills.

The other one-third of the Town's homes are served by the California Water Service Company of San Jose, which has asked for a voluntary 15 percent reduction in water usage.

The difference in the availability of water is due to the source.

Purissima Hills buys its water from the San Francisco Water Department. The source is the Hetch Hetchy Reservoir on the Tuolumne River in Yosemite National Park.

## Keeping Track

Here is a guide to water conservation prepared by the California Water Service Company:

	Normal Use	Conservation Use
Shower	30-40 gallons for 5 minutes	Reduce length of shower
Brushing Teeth	Tap running 2 gallons	Wet brush, rinse briefly 1/2 gallon
Tub Bath	Full 36 gallons	Minimal water level 10-12 gals.
Shaving	Tap running 5 gallons	Fill sink or basin 1 gallon
Dishwashing	Tap running 30 gallons	Wash & rinse in sink 5 gals.
Automatic Dishwasher	Full cycle 25 gallons	Wash full loads short cycle 12 gals.
Washing Hands	Tap running 2 gallons	Fill basin 1 gallon
Toilet Flushing	5-7 gallons/flush	Bottles or Bar dam in tank 4-1/2 to 6-1/2 gallons
Washing Machine	Full cycle, tap water level	Wash full loads short cycle

Francisco water officials. Bill McCann, manager of the Purissima Hills Water District, says the San Franciscans view Los Altos Hills and Hillsborough with a Robin Hood-type attitude of stealing from the rich to give to the poor. Hillsborough is being ordered to cut back even a little more than Los Altos Hills. San Francisco officials respond that water for cooking and cleaning has a higher priority than water for landscaping. San Francisco residents, who have limited or no landscaping, may be asked to cut use only 14 percent.

The California Water Service Company, on the other hand, has secured water from a variety of sources, none of them in San Francisco, reports Ken Roed, Vice President for Corporate Communications.

Approximately 40 percent of the Company's water comes from deep wells, many of them in the Los Altos and Los Altos Hills area.

The other 60 percent of the water comes from state and federal water systems. Some of the water may come from San Luis Reservoir via the recently completed San Felipe aqueduct project. The company also draws on water stored behind Oroville Dam and on the greatest source of all, Shasta Lake and the Sacramento River.

"We will be extremely concerned should we suffer a third year of drought," Roed said, "not because we would run out of water, but because of possible subsidence in the Santa Clara Valley floor. Currently, percolation is maintaining the water table and preventing subsidence."

## Small Tax Levied for Vector Control

The Los Altos Hills City Council has voted to join a countywide Vector Control District that will combat such disease-bearing pests as rats, mosquitoes and ticks.

The cost is expected to be \$3.36 a year per household, which will appear as a levy on property tax bills.

## North County Library Tax Reduced

The North County Library Authority, whose members represent Los Altos, Los Altos Hills and adjacent unincorporated areas that also use the two Los Altos libraries, has lowered the special library assessment for the coming fiscal year by \$9 per household.

Two years ago, voters in the area approved a maximum tax override of \$35 per household to maintain and improve library services. The authority levied a tax of \$29 the first year and \$33 this current year. In the year starting July 1, the tax will drop to \$24.



## Sheriff's Corner

### Vacation Safety

The approaching summer months inevitably make tourists out of many of us. Vacations are a time for family fun and relaxation.

Becoming a crime victim away from home or returning to a burglarized home, though, can sour the best of memories. Here are a few tips to reduce the risk of someone's entering your home while you are gone:

- Lock all doors and secure all windows.
- Make the home appear lived-in by installing inexpensive timers for lights, radios and other appliances.
- Have a trusted neighbor or friend pick up mail and newspapers. Stopping regularly scheduled services such as newspaper delivery, gardening and pool maintenance merely signals your absence.
- Leave an itinerary with a friend or neighbor so that you may be reached in an emergency.

While you are on the road, don't carry large sums of money. Maintain traveler's checks and credit card numbers in a safe place and carry the phone numbers to call in the event checks or credit cards are lost or stolen.

If your vehicle becomes disabled, don't hitch a ride to the nearest service station. Instead, raise your hood and tie a white handkerchief to the antenna. Stay in your locked car and ask a helpful motorist who might stop to telephone the police or a garage.

Before leaving the hotel for sightseeing tours, ask for directions to those attractions you wish to visit. Find out which areas of town you should avoid and stick to well-lighted streets and public areas. Looking lost may make you an easy target for crime.

## Many Landowners Subdivide This Year

Los Altos Hills expects to consider subdivisions this year that if approved would create 110 lots for homes.

The two largest subdivisions are both located off Stonebrook Drive.

The largest, Quarry Hills, would include the Patton Brothers Quarry as well as the ridge southwest of the Town limits and is currently planned for 43 lots.

A smaller parcel at Stonebrook and Prospect abutting Interstate 280 is proposed to have 32 lots.

A proposal has been filed to subdivide the Adobe Creek Lodge property into 10 lots, and another proposal would divide the adjacent Gaither property into three lots.

Other subdivisions of from 2 to 5 lots are on Stonebrook Court, Priscilla Lane, Prospect Avenue, Hilltop Drive, Miraloma Way, Altamont Road, Elena Road, and Gerth Lane.

## Bids Sought for Roads, Sewers, Drains

The Town expects to seek bids in August for repairs and improvements to 22 roads scattered through the

Once you have reached your destination, always remember to lock your car both when leaving and entering it. Park in well-lighted, busy areas and secure valuables out of sight, preferably in the trunk. Check the back seat before getting back into your vehicle. Don't advertise that you are a tourist. Store maps and travel brochures in the glove box.

If your travel plans include staying at a hotel or motel, here are some tips:

- Determine the most direct route to and from your room, and the locations of fire exits, elevators, telephone and extinguishers.
- Unpack and place belongings in the closets and dressers to prevent someone's stealing a filled suitcase. Arrange your belongings so you'll recognize that something is missing.
- Lock the emptied suitcases so they cannot be easily used to carry away your belongings.
- Place extra cash and jewelry or other valuables in the hotel safe. Never leave money, car keys or credit cards unattended in your room.

and improvements to 55 roads scattered through the Town.

Among the projects will be resurfacing on Elena Road between Natoma Road and La Barranca and on Fremont Road between Burke Road and Robleda Avenue. A section of Corbetta Lane is to be reconstructed.

Bids are being sought to build three sewer lines to serve 42 houses in an assessment district that includes O'Keefe Lane, Dianne Drive, La Rena Drive and Vista Serena.

Upon completion of this project, approximately 1100 of the Town's 2,700 homes will be connected to sanitary sewers rather than septic tanks. Approximately half of the homes with sewers are connected to the Los Altos sewage system and half to Palo Alto's system.

The Town also has advertised for bids on increasing the capacity of storm drains along nine streets, Page Mill Road, Fremont Road, St. Francis Drive, La Paloma Road, Alto Verde Lane, Roble Veneno Lane, Viscaino Road, Corte Madera Lane and Concepcion Road.

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## Disintegrating Delineators No Problem

Many of the orange plastic flaps marking the center of newly paved roads are being destroyed by cars driving over them. That's exactly what is supposed to happen.

The plastic delineators were placed under and through the new surface merely to guide workers repainting the center stripes. Experience has shown that placing delineators during paving is the most economical way to track the new center lines. In the future, use of these delineators is likely to become common during road improvements throughout the state.
