Home Construction

HOME CONSTRUCTION Increases in 1987

Los Altos Hills issued building permits for 42 new homes in 1987, six more than the 36 in 1986.

Most other building activities also increased in 1987. Here is a list of the building permits:

	1987	1986
Additions	59	53
Interior Remodeling	28	17
Swimming Pools	16	15
Tennis Courts	1	5
Re-roofing	44	33

The sale of existing houses increased to 121 in 1987, compared with 83 in 1986, and the total sales volume grew from \$48.7 million in 1986 to \$88.4 million in 1987.


The average home sold was \$587,163 in 1986, and in 1987, the average rose to \$696,099.

Despite the addition of new homes in the hills each year, the town's population is not expected to grow substantially, according to projections by the Association of Bay Area Governments (ABAG). There are only a few hundred unimproved building sites left in the town, and the size of the average household is expected to decline.

The current population of Los Altos Hills is about 8,000 and an additional 1,300 people live in unincorporated areas considered to be within the sphere of Los Altos Hills, for a total population of 9,300. By the year 2005, ABAG predicts the population will have grown to only 9,800 people.

The ABAG study predicts that in the year 2005, 83 percent of the adults in Los Altos Hills will be em-

ployed in services, which includes the categories of professional and medical services, entertainment, repair shops and business personnel. This figure compares with 26 percent of the people countywide being employed in services.

Eight People Run for City Council

Residents to be Surveyed

A 15-member General Plan Steering Committee is considering what issues to include in a survey of all Hills residents. The Town may hire a consultant to assist in the survey's preparation to ensure that the results will be useful and valid in determining how most residents would like to see the Town develop.

The committee encourages community involvement throughout the General Plan update process, which is expected to be completed in the summer of 1989.

Los Altos Libraries Improve Services, Collections

The Santa Clara County Libraries in Los Altos have updated and enhanced their collections of new books, tape-recorded books, biographies and research materials with money provided by the 1985 property tax override election.

A survey conducted last year found users of the Main Library 3 to 1 in favor of more evening hours and Sunday hours, so the library is now open Monday through Thursday, 10 a.m. to 9 p.m.; Friday and Saturday, 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.; and Sunday 1 to 5 p.m.

Woodland Library users were divided on wanting late morning or early evening hours, so the Woodland hours were established as Monday through Wednesday, 1 p.m. to 8 p.m., and Thursday through Saturday, 11 a.m. to 5 p.m.

In response to other results of

the survey, the libraries have added these collections and services:

- New computer and investment magazines
- Video cassettes that can be checked out
- InfoTrac, a database to search magazines
- Bedtime Stories, a program for children
- Financial and other seminars for adults.

In addition, the Friends of the Library have provided funds for a library computer that can be used by the public.

The North County Library Authority, whose members represent Los Altos, Los Altos Hills, and adjacent unincorporated areas, has established the override tax rate of \$33 per parcel this year.

Two Major Annexations Under Review

The Los Altos Garbage Company will offer free pickup of trash for its customers at five locations from 7:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Saturday, March 12.

The locations are:

- Town Hall Parking Lot
- Magdalena at Interstate 280
- Foothill College Parking Lot A
- Altamont Road at Black Mountain Road
- Page Mill Road at Arastradero Road.

Additional clean-up days will be held the second Saturdays of June, September and December.

A series of public hearings has begun to consider applications for annexation of two large areas adjacent the Town.

The first of these areas is San Antonio Hills (West) at the southeastern end of the Town. This area is largely developed and has 275 homes.

The second application, Quarry Hills, is for 360 undeveloped acres that include the quarry off Stonebrook Avenue. DeAnza Properties, the owner, proposes to construct 43 homes on the property.

The public hearings will be announced in local newspapers. The hearings also will be announced

by the Town's Dial-Agenda recording, which can be reached by phoning 941-7225.

County Recorder Opens New Office

The Santa Clara County Recorder's Office is offering services on Wednesdays and Thursdays at the Los Altos Main Library, 13 South San Antonio Road. The hours are 10 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. on Wednesdays and noon to 8 p.m. on Thursdays.

An employee of the Recorder's Office will be on hand to check official records to produce copies of marriage, birth or death certificates.

Indian Exhibit at Town Hall

An exhibit of North American Indian baskets, paintings, pottery and artifacts is being shown in the City Council Chambers, 26379 Fremont Road.

The exhibit is open to the public from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday and will continue through March.

The largest collection in the exhibit belongs to Town Historian Rosemary Meyerott, who received her first silver Navajo bracelet in 1927. Artifacts from archeological digs in Santa Clara County have been loaned from the collection of Florence Fava, who was the Town's first historian.

been a series of residential burglaries in Los Altos Hills and surrounding communities which are being committed by a group of three or four individuals. They have been described as males and females who appear to be of Mediterranean extraction. The suspects park their vehicles close by and walk up to residences where they assume no one is at home. They knock on the front door and on occasion will go to the rear door. If confronted, they will ask for some fictional person or explain that they are looking for a lost pet. On two occasions, the homeowners left shortly after one of these encounters, only to return and find they had been burglarized.

If a stranger requests to come into your home to use your telephone, ask them to wait outside and offer to make the call for them. **DON'T LET THEM IN.** If you see strangers in the area who appear out of place or suspicious, dial 911 and ask for the Sheriff's Department. Your identity will remain confidential.
