LANDSCAPING SUGGESTIONS FROM THE ENVIRONMENTAL DESIGN COMMITTEE

Spring is here—let's go native! Yes, let's go native and blend our houses into our wonderful Los Altos Hills. Let's go native and forget about watering, forget about bugs and diseases which native plants are often immune to. Do you know that you can have color from native plants almost all year long? Do you want a red bush in spring? Try a Redbush, or yellow in summer? Get a Flannel Bush, or a blue in the fall? Try a sage. Do you have a dry spot? Try a California Oaks, Cotton Wood or Digger Pine. A wet spot? Try a Bigleaf maple, Tanbark Oak, or Redwood. Do you know that natives live longer than imports? Do you know that you can have a delicious fragrance from our bushes? Yes, you can have all of that and more—shade trees—open trees all giving you the natural look. Above all, go native and make your land part of the hills. You'll save water and we'll help you get there.

We've listed some nurseries that will help you because they specialize in California native plants. Or call us and we'll try to help you or get the information for you. We assure you that you'll be happy with our native beauty and low, low maintenance. Many flowers, shrubs and trees can be seen in their natural habitat at the Yerba Buena Nursery on Skyline Boulevard south of Route 84. Other suggestions for nurseries include the Christensen Nursery in Belmont and Saratoga and the Saratoga Horticultural Foundation in Saratoga.

ANNIVERSARY BANQUET

On January 31, 1981 an Anniversary Banquet was held at the Fremont Hills Country Club in celebration of the Town's Twenty fifth Anniversary. Tickets were sold out well in advance and the evening of the 31st found the Country Club packed to capacity with those eager to celebrate such an important occasion.

The festivities included a delicious banquet with wine provided by the Page Mill Winery of Los Altos Hills and entertainment by the Los Altos High Harmatans who were directed by Leonard Cook. The program for the evening was introduced by Richard Henning, Dean of Community Services at Foothill College and an invocation was given by Rabbi Sidney Akselrad.

Mayor Nystrom then welcomed all those in attendance and introduced the guest speakers for the evening, Congressman Pete McCloskey and Senator Alan Cranston. Each of their talks was interesting, informative and certainly one of the highlights of the evening. Several others participated in the program including Sena-



tor Dan O'Keefe, Assemblyman Ernest Konnyu and former member of the Board of Supervisors Geraldine Steinberg. Each presented a Resolution to the Town in honor of its Anniversary. The program was concluded with a Benediction by the Reverend George McNeely.

It would be impossible to name all those who joined in the evening. Many were involved in the Incorporation 25 years ago and could certainly feel



proud of their Town. Others perhaps were newcomers to Los Altos Hills but they too joined in celebrating the anniversary of a very special place to live. It was a wonderful opportunity for everyone to mingle and share stories and friendships in a congenial atmosphere.

HISTORICAL SOCIETY

On January 27, 1981, the 25th Anniversary of the Incorporation of Los Altos Hills, the Historical Society hosted a birthday party at Town Hall. This event was the first in a series of celebrations planned for the Anniversary Year. Residents braved a terrific rainstorm to attend the party and to view the silver cannister which held copies of significant Town papers, memorabilia and, among other things, one of the Town's special anniversary flags. After the weather improved, this cannister was buried on the grounds of Town Hall and will be opened again 25 years from now during the Town's 50th Anniversary! The Brownies from Bullis School presented a gift to the Town of a beautiful handmade quilt, each square depicting an aspect of life in Los Altos Hills. Irma Goldsmith, President of the Historical Society and Mistress of Ceremonies for the Birthday Party, presented an Award of Merit to Gardner Bullis for his long and dedicated service to the Town.

In addition, Mayor James Nystrom spoke briefly to the group and several residents and members of the Town Hall staff were introduced. Many thanks to Mrs. Goldsmith and the Historical Society for arranging such a nice afternoon in honor of the Town's 25th Anniversary.

Concerning other items of interest regarding the Historical Society, Yvonne Jacobsen had an exhibit of the History of Farming in the Santa Clara Valley at Syntex Gallery during the month of April. On April 11 she took members of the Historical Society and their guests on a tour of this exhibit. On May 3 the Historical Society displayed old animal husbandry and farm equipment at the Hidden Villa Fiesta.

COUNTRY FAIR SATURDAY, MAY 30, 1981

HAPPENINGS AT WESTWIND

A very successful landscaping work day was held _____ be an art show, a drawing and demonstrations by _____

at Westwind Barn on March 28, spearheaded by Board Member Chuck Marsh. Westwind members planted over 70 trees and shrubs as well as ground cover on the slope behind the riding arena. Some live oaks still remain to be planted and, when accomplished, Phase 1 of the landscaping project will be complete. Steps are now being taken to prepare the Barn for a spring/summer painting—an enormous task to which all interested parties are invited to take part! A date has not been set, but it is anticipated that this project will get underway soon.

On June 7 Westwind 4-H Riding for the Handicapped and CYS (The California Youth Symphony) will co-sponsor a Benefit at the San Mateo County Mounted Patrol Grounds in Woodside. The symphony will play selections from Wagner, Mozart, Sibelius and others. There will be equestrian demon-



strations with accompaniment by the Symphony, which will include the Sundance Vaulters (National Champions), the Osierlea Quadrille (a 12-member team of dressage riders), a Pas de Deux and a Grand Prix Dressage Demonstration. In addition there will
