Oil Paintings & Sculpture Exhibit at Town Hall

Local Artist Jean McCandless will display her oil paintings and sculptures between April 14th and May 31st at our Town Hall Chambers. A reception will be held on Sunday, April 14th from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m.

Jean and her husband, Charles are long time residents of Los Altos Hills. McCandless' oil paintings and sculptures are usually

large, abstract and colorful. Some reflect an Asian influence as a result of working with the celebrated artist Kishi. The "Spring Series" shows the



excitement of the season in movement and color. Bronze sculptures run the gamut from small realistic figures and animals to pure abstraction. There are fabricated aluminum pieces, painted in bright colors, which work well in the garden. A commissioned work can be up to 12 feet high.

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Home Computer Survey: Results

The Town of Los Altos Hills has established a Technology Improvement Committee to investigate and recommend ways for using modern telecommunications and computer technology to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of our Town Government.

As part of that review, the Committee wanted to understand the extent to which residents currently use computers at home, their ability to communicate with other systems via modem and their interest in communicating with the Town Government via computer. Consequently, a Home Computer Survey was developed by the Committee and sent to the residents in a previous issue of this Newsletter. Here are the highlights:

The response rate was 14%! (4% is generally considered high for mail surveys.)

Pathways Day! Saturday, June 1st Mark Your Calendars!!

Breathtaking overviews, pastoral settings and nature's wondrous scenery await you on Saturday, June 1st when members of the Pathway Committee will lead guided tours through paths in our town. Separate tours for equestrians and pedestrians will begin from Westwind Barn, located on Altamont Road. The Outings will begin at 10 a.m., and return to Westwind Barn by noon, for refreshments provided by the Community Relations Committee. Regardless of your age or abil-

❑ There is at least one computer in 93% of the respondent's homes. (It is difficult to draw specific conclusions about those not responding.)

❑ The types of computers are relatively evenly divided between IBM Compatibles and Apples. (There is a significantly higher Apple ownership than in the market as a whole.)

❑ Sixty-eight percent of the residents who replied connect with a modem to either an information utility (CompuServe, AOL, etc.), the Internet, their company computer or several of these, while 32% did not connect to other computers with a modem.

❑ Over 80% of the respondents said they might occasionally (several times/year) or frequently (several times per month) call a Town computer to exchange administrative or governmental information.

We want to thank the residents who completed and returned the Survey. The Technology Improvement Committee will use this information in formulating its new plans for the use of computers at Town Hall.




Heritage House - "Protects" the Sheriff

The Santa Clara County Sheriff which services the Town of Los Altos Hills now has a permanent office at the Heritage House. While their main function is to patrol the roads of Los Altos Hills and to respond to resident emergency calls, a certain amount of the deputies' time is used to perform administrative duties. While in the office, each deputy is very willing to meet with residents to discuss related topics, so long as they make an appointment ahead of time through the Town

ity, you will enjoy this opportunity to exercise, to learn and to meet new people.

Maps of the Town's pathways were mailed to all residents in 1994 as part of the Town information packet. If you did not receive a map or you are new to the community, you can purchase a Pathways Map at Town Hall for \$2.00.

Volunteers on the Los Altos Hills Pathway Committee serve as overseers of the pathway system. Along with the Town Planner, Public Works Manager, and Town Crew, the Committee assists in the design, construction, and maintenance of paths. The Committee and Maintenance Crew are responsible for placing pathway posts at pathway entrances, determining feasibility of pathways, and naming pathways to honor citizens who have contributed to the pathways system and to the community. The Committee welcomes input from all residents to assist them in identifying and addressing pathway needs. If you notice any problems with the pathways, please submit a request for pathway maintenance to Town Hall. Keeping our pathways safe and enjoyable for everyone in the community is the Town's goal.

The Under-Rated Utility Our Septic Systems


Approximately 2 of every 3 homes in Los Altos Hills are on what is called a Septic System. There is a map at Town Hall that shows which lots are connected to public sewer lines and those using septic systems. New construction within 400 feet of a Town sewer is required to "hook up." Septic systems are regulated by the Santa Clara County Department of Environmental Health. They are located at 2220 Moorpark Avenue, San Jose, 95128. Before constructing or repairing a system, you must give them a call at (408) 299-6060.

Here are some important considerations about these systems and their requirements for periodic maintenance.

What is Wastewater?

Wastewater is the aggregate of all water disposed from sinks, showers, baths, disposals, toilets and washing machines which contain microorganisms (including bacteria and viruses) which can be a hazard to public health if discharged in groundwater, surface water, or on surfaces.

What is A Septic System? How Does it work?

The septic system consists of a tank (usually 1,500 gallons), and a leachfield. The tank removes solids by letting them settle downwards while being biologically digested by natural anaerobic bacteria. One byproduct, hydrogen sulfide, may occasionally be emitted through a vent. This "rotten egg" fragrance is normal, and should not be cause for concern.

The upper layers (known as sludge and scum) must be removed periodically to prevent accumulation from flowing into the leachfield and clogging the pipe and soil pores. *THIS IS IMPORTANT* when using garbage disposals, which cause more rapid accumulation, requiring more frequent cleaning.

The leachfield consists of a system of trenches 2 feet wide by 3 feet high, with a 4-inch perforated pipe set into a bed of washed rock which dissipates the effluent, while protecting from root growth. Organic material dissolved in the exiting effluent is dissolved by aerobic (with air) bacteria living between the interface of the trench and the undisturbed soil.

What Can Go Wrong?

Septic Tank: Very little - possible structural breakdown, clogged line from the house, or deterioration of redwood lids in older tanks. *Leachfield:* Carry-over of solid waste from the tank, or "biological clogging" at the trench/soil interface. Reduced flow capacity with age.

Signs of Malfunction:

Odors, persistent wet spots, isolated lush growth near system; sluggish house plumbing over time, or during heavy use or wet weather; outflow resistance after tank cleaning.

Maintenance:

It is essential that solids be removed before they enter the leachfield system. Waiting may lead to costly and irreversible repairs! As a general rule: Pump your Septic Tank every 3 to 5 years, adjusting this up or down depending on system use.

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WHAT'S NEW AT WESTWIND BARN ?

This year many substantial and cosmetic improvements are underway at Westwind Barn. Roof repairs have been completed. The bathroom is now refurbished to meet ADA standards. The arena surface and fencing are complete, and have held up well during the wet weather. The project is expected to be completely finished, with irrigation system, spectator benches and a judge's booth, in time for the first show of the season.

Equestrians who board their horses elsewhere are welcome to use the riding arenas or take lessons from one of the well-qualified instructors. You may simply become a "Facility User" for a nominal annual fee of \$25 plus \$15 per month of use. Other benefits include regular equine shots and worming clinics. Pacific Ridge Pony Club holds meetings at Westwind Barn, and in the summer "schooling" horse shows are open to the public. Although there usually is a waiting list for stalls or pasture rental, Los Altos Hills residents receive priority.

Westwind Barn is also home to the "4-H Riding for the Handicapped" program, which serves children with special needs. LAH FIRE PREVENTION PLANS

Probably the most dangerous potential disaster for residents of Los Altos Hills is a fire storm. The last major fire occurred in 1985 when a number of homes were completely lost and others were severely damaged. In an effort to minimize the potential of a major fire, the Town of Los Altos Hills annually requires regular weed abatement, as well as proper fire retardant construction materials and landscaping. However, certain areas in the Town have extensive hazardous landscaping, i.e., large areas of brush which can easily burn - on both private and public land.

To reduce the potential of fire in these areas, the Town - in conjunction with the Los Altos County Fire Protection District and the Los Altos Fire Department - is starting a pilot project. If successful, the concept will be used throughout the Town. The Town has closed the area around Byrne Preserve at night and is evaluating the possibility of cutting back flammable brush and establishing "defensible space" areas for fire prevention. Under this project, all affected residents will be contacted by the LAFD who will survey their property, and make recommendations for establishing a defensive area around each home, thereby protecting the community as a whole. This survey is being done on a volunteer basis. Once completed, residents will need to clear out the brush in the recommended areas on their property and create the defensible space areas. The Town will clear recommended areas on public property. The extent of success in building these defensive areas will determine whether or not the Town will proceed to other neighborhoods within the Town. This first project will be completed in 1996.

The Town of Los Altos Hills has one of the best all-volunteer neighborhood emergency networks in Northern California. Established in 1985, it now is in need of updating due to normal turn-over and movement of residents. The Town has been laid out to have thirty-five small neighborhoods. Each neighborhood has at least one Neighborhood Coordinator who works with the local residents to *plan ahead* for the handling of any emergency. Due to the uncertainty of an earthquake or major fire, the basic purpose of the emergency network is to make everyone as self-sufficient as possible and to promote the concept of "neighbors helping neighbors." Neighborhood Coordinators also help in other useful ways such as alerting neighbors to local burglaries, and to earth movements during heavy rain periods.

In order to update the Neighborhood Emergency Network, the Los Altos Hills Safety Committee is inviting five different Neighborhood Coordinators to each regular monthly meeting (held the third Tuesday of each month) to discuss

The crack of the bat, the smack of the leather mitt, and the roar of the crowd arising from Los Altos Hills can only mean one thing in the Spring ... It's **LITTLE LEAGUE SEASON!**



Over 400 Los Altos Hills youth from age 6 into high school play T-Ball, softball, and baseball each year from March into the summer. Kids from Los Altos Hills play on teams with schoolmates from Los Altos and Palo Alto in what has become one of the nicest Little League Parks and one of the strongest programs in the Bay Area. Behind these 400 kids is a legion of parents, volunteers and sponsors who make it all happen. Bats, balls, uniforms, coaches, clinics, ball park maintenance and repairs, snack bar, fund raising, and games require thousands of hours of volunteer time making Little League the largest organized community activity in Los Altos Hills. Each year 35 Hills Little League teams play nearly 500 games against teams from the area and participate in tournaments with players from all over Northern California.

Little League leaders point with pride to their program at the Little League Fields on Purissima Road. Each year for five seasons, coaches attend a weekend "Coaches Clinic" presented by professional youth coaches Al Herback and Al Price to teach the coaches how to coach the kids. "Al and Al Baseball," based in Edmonton, Alberta, present clinics all over North America. Fundamentals of throwing, catching, and hitting are taught so that each year coaches and players are developing consistent basics. Just as important as teaching good fundamentals, Little League coaches are taught how to get best results for kids through enhancing their self esteem and playing team sports. Kids "try out" for Little League but every kid makes a team. Teams are "drafted" to provide a balance in each league so that the leading teams in the first half of the season often find tough going in the second half of the season.

Committee has an on-going project to welcome newcomers to our Town. An informative packet of Town material is available for all newcomers, including a welcoming letter from the Town Council, the new Town Handbook, information from the Chamber of Commerce, the Library and other organizations, and voter registration forms. The welcoming letter encourages every newcomer to stop by Town Hall to say "Hello" and pick up a full packet. If that is inconvenient, the newcomer may call the telephone number given in the letter and a packet will be mailed to them.



The Committee has found that the best way to obtain the names and addresses of the new residents in our Town is through new requests for utility service! The Committee receives a monthly list of new customers as a courtesy from the Los Altos Garbage Company and sends the welcoming letter to all of the names on the list. Approximately 200 newcomers are welcomed each year.

These are used each Spring for sending a special letter to all newcomers inviting them to the annual Spring Town function every May, either the Spring Greeting at Town Hall, or the S'Bring in the Hills dinner dance which has been held at the Fremont Hills Country Club.


