Landscape for a More Fire-Safe Home

The East Bay Hills fire last October reminded many Town residents of our own fire in July 1985. Again we have been made more aware that the fuel in our hills has the potential for devastating fires. The following advice is offered for a safer landscape and home:

- All plants can burn — there are no fire-proof plants. The more fuel the hotter the fire, so... keep in mind that plants close to the house should be kept fairly small. Large shrubs and trees against the house or under eaves are potentially dangerous. If you must plant next to your home for aesthetic reasons keep plants well pruned and well watered.
- Clean up all dead plant material within thirty (30) feet of the house; low groundcovers or ornamentals are recommended for this area.
- Trees should not overhang the roof, particularly shake roofs.
- Wood decks on hills should not have shrubs or any fuel mass planted below them. Fire usually sweeps uphill. Enclosing the lower side is also a good idea.
- A "fire ladder" can be created by planting shrubs under trees, or leaving debris where it could catch fire and ignite the tree. To avoid this, plant only low-growing plants under trees and prune off the lower limbs of the tree, creating a fire break. Thin out the plants regularly to remove fuel.
- Native wild land shrubs should not be allowed to grow too thick. Spaces between them help in a fire situations. Clearing, however, will lead to erosion

less so than keeping the quantity of fuel sparse within 30 feet of your house and below it if you live on a hill.

- If you are planning to put on a new roof, remember that shakes and shingles, when on fire, spark and fly great distances, igniting trees and other roofs. Therefore, class A roofs are recommended, even if not mandatory.
- Our Town has a free year-round garden debris recycling center on Purissima Road near the Little League fields for residents to use Wednesday through Sunday, 10–4, and four free "Dump Days" for other household debris. Check your Los Altos Garbage Co. bill for the dates.
- Street trees are to be maintained by the homeowner, but a free permit is required if any removal is to be done.

More information on fire retardant plants may be obtained at Sunset Magazine in Menlo Park, or your local nursery. Other fire safety reminders are:

- Make sure your street number is clearly visible to fire responders at the street.
- Keep driveway clear 10 feet wide and 12 feet high for emergency vehicles, and maintain a clear place for turn-around.

Wood Smoke in the Bay Area; A Burning Issue

During the cold winter months, many of us enjoy relaxing by a fireplace or wood stove. But for all the enjoyment a fire may bring, it has some undesirable effects. Its smoke contributes to outdoor pollution and may endanger the health of those who breathe it.

Wood smoke contains carbon monoxide particles and toxic chemicals such as benzene, formaldehyde and polycyclic organic matter. When the air is stagnant, as is often the case, pollution levels can build up and become unhealthy.

You can do something to help. When air quality is approaching unhealthy levels, the Bay Area Air

Thank You for Saving Water

Los Altos Hills residents exceeded water conservation goals for 1991, saving an average of 35% per household over 1987 usage levels.

With reservoirs in Santa Clara County at less than 10% of capacity, difficulty obtaining outside supplies, and low rainfall so far this winter, residents are being asked to maintain their outstanding efforts into the future.

Household Toxics Drop-off

Residents of Los Altos Hills may now participate in the new county-wide Household Hazardous Waste Program. Opportunities to safely

Quality Management District is asking residents to voluntarily stop burning wood in their fireplaces or wood stoves until pollution levels go down. An exception is made for the new EPA Phase II certified wood stoves, which are 90 percent cleaner than most other stoves.

If air quality is poor, a "Don't Light Tonight" message will be announced through the media, and will be carried on the Air District's air quality information number: 1-800-794-SMOG. dispose or potentially hazardous materials will be offered 10-12 times a year. Drop-off of materials will be done by appointment to eliminate waiting in line.

More on Fire Safety

Some tips from Town Hall:

- Firefighters and Sheriff deputies ask that visible, preferably reflective, house numbers be used to help them find every home in an emergency.
- Fire retardant roofing is strongly recommended. (This issue will be on the June 1992 ballot.)
- Only use the 9-1-1 emergency call system for real emergency situations. Don't call for information during general emergencies. Los Altos Hills' 9-1-1 system is routed through the Los Altos Fire Department, so if you want a Sheriff's Deputy, ask promptly.
- Watering down roofs during fires works against hydrant pressure needed by firefighters. If fire is approaching, evacuate immediately.
- Anyone who would need special assistance in the event of an emergency should make arrangements ahead of time with neighbors. Our Town's Emergency Coordinator program will be of significant assistance to the Fire and Sheriff's Departments.
- Because only emergency vehicles will be allowed access in a fire situation, horse owners should realize that it may be difficult to remove horses by trailer. Other arrangements should be made; lead them out, or in the worst case let them loose.

Historian's Notes!

A Gift to the Heritage Preserve

In November John Bettencourt, who does rototilling, plowing, and discing in the Town, donated a wonderful old piece of agricultural equipment to our Heritage Preserve — a McCormick-Deering Mowing Machine, one horse-drawn, circa 1895, very rare. It is placed behind Heritage House, beside the vintage hay baler donated by the Taaffe family in 1983, which inspired our farming museum of agricultural equipment used in the Hills long before incorporation.

We are still looking for donations. The 1900 goose-neck wagon used in orchards and the large hayrake at the entrance to Town Hall are all part of our heritage too. Other items are still awaiting pick-up, such as old hand plows, a McCormick Seeder, and a windmill pump. An offer of a concrete roller from Esther Clark's property has been made by her nephew. We have two Fresno Scrapers used in making orchard roads; an offer of a 1900 Bean Co. sprayer rig was made by Clarence Maurer in 1983. Other donations

include blacksmith tools such as hammers, tongs, and a 500 pound anvil; a milk-cream separator, ca. 1900, long-handled scythe; a 1900 water-trough; horse collars and special horse shoes.

Looking Back into History

On Tuesday, January 10, 1956, some long-time friends and neighbors eyed each other with cold suspicion as voters moved along the winding roads to two polling places, the homes of L.P. Leene, Hillview Drive, between Hilltop Drive and Magdalena Avenue, and of Irene A. Lockwood, 27231 Elena Avenue. On that rainy night polls closed at 7:00 p.m. The simple incorporation ballot was tallied and showed 424 yes votes to 339 no votes. Thus the Town of Los Altos Hills became Santa Clara County's fourteenth city (population 2,500; area 9-1/2 square miles; roads, 29 miles) by a close margin. A total 763 voters had spoken (65% of some 1,200 eligibles), plus 7 who cast absentee ballots, affording a yes vote of 54%. The official date of the Town's incorporation, allowing time for county reaffirmation, was to become *January 27, 1956*. On January 23, 1956, Los Altos Hills was officially declared a sixth-class city (one of a class of cities having a population of more than 3,300, but not exceeding 8,000).

Hills history was made with the swearing-in on January 30, 1956, of the Town's first Council: Easton Rothwell, Leighton Bledsoe, Sidney Treat, Arthur Fowle (replaced by son, John Fowle, after a heart attack), and Ted Dungan. Sidney Treat was elected Mayor and Ted Dungan, Deputy Mayor. All of these men are now deceased, with the exception of Leighton Bledsoe, who still resides in the Hills.

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

to be Installed**






Unsung Hero

Budget Recap 1984 – 1992






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Staff Changes
