NEW TOWN HALL

A Mission Style Beauty

At long last the Los Altos Hills new Town Hall is becoming a reality. The renowned architect, John Goldman,

from San Francisco presented the renderings of the mission style building and general schematic drawings to the City Council on April 18.

The cost of the project is estimated at \$3.5 million. It will be paid for from the Town budget, however, a portion is expected to come from donations.

The current Town Hall is 47 years old and is in need of replacement. It does not meet current building codes and needs seismic retrofitting. In the past, there have been serious electrical malfunctions resulting in fires. There is a serious lack of space to carry out the public's business in the current building.

The City Council has approved the new mission style building, approximately 6900 square feet. It will include an interior courtyard built around the heritage oak tree, expanded front area reception space, additional office space, larger Council Chambers to accommodate 100 people (present capacity 60), meeting rooms, employee lounge and catering kitchen (that will facilitate public events at Town Hall). The Sheriff's officers and public works officials will relocate from the Heritage House to inside the New Town Hall.

The process used for developing the new proposed Town Hall included a programmatic needs assessment by soliciting input from all of the volunteer committees, staff, and council members. Residents surrounding the Town Hall have had an opportunity to review the proposed new building in meetings with Council members

resulting in some changes in the design.

Refinements are currently underway to develop more detail that includes input from the City Council concerning minor changes to floor plans that will indicate flexibility of the work spaces for future expansion or contraction.



Entrance to the New Town Hall will be directly from Fremont Road - this represents a big

change. There will be 52 parking spaces compared with 44 currently on the site. Heritage House will be moved to another location - yet to be determined.

As soon as the final schematics are completed, the public will have an opportunity to comment on the space and building.

Groundbreaking will not take place until fall, at the earliest. It is anticipated that construction will take 18 months.

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CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

Status of 2002 Park Bond Act Funding

When voters approved the 2002 Park Bond Act on March 5, 2002, cities were assured a minimum of \$220,000 each in per capita funding for eligible park projects. The Park Bond Act of 2000, by comparison, allocated \$75,000 to the Town which has yet to be earmarked for a particular project. We used our Roberti-Z' Berg-Harris allocation of \$24,167 from the 2000 Act for the playground equipment at the Little League fields. The Town's allocation from the 2002 Roberti-Z' Berg funds has not been announced but it would be in addition to the \$220,000 in per capita funding.

Report on Building Technician "Job Shadowing"

To stimulate new customer service and work processing ideas, Building Technician Jeanne Evilsizer recently arranged for a "job shadowing" exchange with her counterpart from the Town of Los Gatos. Both staff members benefited from the opportunity to observe each others work activities during the course of the business day.

Connection of Town Emergency Operations Center to Water District EOC Back-up Communications System

On April 24, the Town received a Santa Clara Valley Water District EOC email system PC on "permanent" loan which was installed in the Heritage House. The District's EOC email system is a backup to the email network between all Santa Clara County Operational Area Emergency Operations Centers and is intended to compliment the existing Op Area EOC to EOC radio system. This is an independent email backup system, not a rival or substitute for the discontinued SCOA RIMS program.

Contract Public Safety Officer Position Filled

On May 6, 2002, Steven Garcia will commence his duties as the Town's contract Public Safety Officer which is funded by COPS. He will provide emergency planning /operations support, do code enforcement for Planning and offer assistance to our deputies as needed. Steven has had extensive law enforcement, management and customer service experience prior to accepting this position. He will share the Deputy's office in the Heritage House.

Appointment of Associate Engineer

Richard Chen, former Associate Engineer for the City of San Mateo, will join the Town's Engineering staff on May 20. Richard will fill this new position which was created by the recent reorganization of the Engineering and Public Works divisions that eliminated the Public Works Manager. His experience will permit greater mobilization of the Town's CIP, more in-house engineering work and consultant oversight.

PLANNING DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Town Planning approvals for new development since March 2002, include the following: three new residences approved through the Fast Track review process, two major additions, two minor variances, three swimming pools and three landscape screening plans.

The Planning Commission reviewed the following: one new residence, one conditional use permit, one request to amend the Town Master Path Map, the noise ordinance and the draft 2002 General Plan Housing Element. The Planning Commission, in conjunction with the Municipal Code and Policy Review Committee, also studied the Town's policies and rules on conservation easements, driveways, fences, outdoor lighting, structure colors and materials, landscaping and structure siting and forwarded its recommendations to the City Council.

RECENT HOUSE BURGLARIES

Two burglaries occurred in May. Houses were broken into - both on Green Hills Court (off Elena), close to Foothill Campus at about 9:15 PM, while both families were at home.

The burglars did the usual: entered through the master bedroom (one was on the 2nd floor, accessed via balcony), and took only jewelry. Another entered through an opened bathroom window. Several houses with similar patterns, although from different areas of LAH (Summerhill, Normandy, Robleda, now Elena) have suffered burglaries. Be vigilant in watching your neighborhood, report unusual cars or people to the Sheriff by calling 9-1-1.

Deputy Novick (LAH beat officer who took the report on May 1) recommends that residents exercise caution to ensure that their windows are closed, doors locked, garage doors closed and leave their alarms on *while in the house*.

In one case, it appeared that the burglar had initially tried to use a screwdriver to pry open a closed window and then discovered a window that was open.

K-9 Dogs were brought in, but no scent was detected. The Deputy says that the escape route was probably via El Monte, down to the Foothill campus and out to Hwy. 280.

Again, LAH enjoys a very low crime rate - however, such robberies occur in cycles. It behooves all residents to be vigilant and use good precautions.

EMERGENCY COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE LAUNCHES NEW HAM NETWORK

The Los Altos Hills Emergency Communications Committee, recently formed and appointed by the Town Council, now has 15 members.

Led by Scott Overstreet, the Committee is revitalizing and building the Town's amateur radio volunteer network, including the service, skills, and equipment necessary for the Town's emergency communications system.

The ECC meets monthly on the 4th Tuesday evening at 7:30 PM. Each of the members has taken on specialty areas, such as repeater, packet, equipment planning, resource planning, and communication. The emergency communications system will serve as the "eyes and ears" for the town and ensure coverage of its geological heights and depths.

Members of the Committee are Scott Overstreet, Chairman, Rick Ellinger (Emergency Coordinator) Bob Lisbonne, Dru Anderson, Bob Anderson, David Gilmour, David Pratt, Ed Radlo, Jim Abraham, Maynard Stevenson, Paul Simon, Peter Berman, Sam Wood, Robert Smithwick, and Robert Hall.

In April, the Committee - 9 of the Ham Operators of the group - participated in the Santa Clara County Emergency Preparedness drill of similar city and county ham operations teams. This involved a scenario of a flood disaster and the associated perils. ECC members during the 2-hour drill rotated to response locations of simulated emergencies throughout the town. This type of drill, which occurs quarterly, tests the technical operation, and builds teamwork and procedures.

Radio channels technology has been in place for a long time. Some people feel it may be overshadowed by advanced technologies such as cellular phone - until cellular fails either due to overload or lack of commercial power. Then ham radio volunteers return to provide a sustaining service on established radio networks and licensed ham operators become the important focal point for emergency communications. Today, these capabilities include countywide data transmission via packet radio networks.

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MASTER PATHWAY PLAN BEGINS FIRST REVISION IN 21 YEARS

The Town Council last revised the Master Path Plan for Los Altos Hills 21 years ago in 1981. Many new roads, subdivisions, and homes have come into existence since then. The Town Council is in the process of determining what updates to the Master Path Plan need to be implemented.

The Pathway Committee has spent hundreds of man-hours over the last 12 months gathering data to help in updating the existing pathway map for the Town. Currently, Los Altos Hills has over 62 miles of beautiful roadside and off-road paths. Brian Robinson, a Los Altos native and winner of the Hiking Triple Crown, walked every existing path in town in February and March 2002 and recorded each path's map location and condition.

With this valuable information, the Pathway Committee recommended that all existing paths in town, both roadside and off-road, be kept on the new 2002 Master Path Plan. Thereafter, the Pathway Committee reviewed suggested off-road path segments from the old 1981 Master Path Plan where there are currently no existing paths. Each path segment was thoroughly studied and discussed in meetings open to the public, and committee votes were taken for each potential new off-road path in order to make recommendations to the Town Council. Numerous new roadside paths were also discussed and recommended.

The Planning Commission has also reviewed the map and made recommendations. On June 6, 2002 a public hearing with the Town Council will take place to get input from residents on the Master Pathway Plan update. After the Council has reviewed the recommendations from the Pathway Committee and the Planning Commission, and has heard from the residents, the Council will adopt an updated plan.

All residents are urged to study the proposed plan and attend these public meetings to voice your opinion.

TOWN WEB SITE HAS NEW LOOK

If you have visited the Town's web site recently, you will notice a new look. Los Altos Hills recently undertook to upgrade its web site to make it more resident friendly and higher tech. If you have not seen the new web site, you may view it at www.losaltoshills.ca.gov.

Some of the new additions to the web site include a greater use of photos and graphics, expanded information about the Town and its history, recreation programs, pathways, and open space areas. It also includes links to other related websites (Westwind Barn, Mid-Pen Open Space, Hidden Villa, Los Altos School District, and Palo Alto School District), as well as on-line applications for Town recreation programs, Town job openings, and Town volunteer committee openings.

It will also include (soon to be added) agendas, reports, and meeting minutes for Planning Commission, City Council, and Volunteer Committees, for residents to easily access. These will be updated prior to upcoming meetings. Archives of previous meetings (dating back to 1997) will also soon be added to the web site, with an expanded search capability.

Many of the important Town documents have also been added to the web site, including Town Newsletters, General Plan Elements (Housing, Pathway, Circulation, and Land Use), Town Municipal Code (still under development), Emergency Operating Plan, Town Fee Schedule, and 2001-2002 Operating and Capital Budgets.

It also includes contact information for Town Staff, Planning Commission, and City Council members. On-line feedback form have also been added, allowing residents to give feedback on any issues they may have relating to the Town.

At a future time, there will be additional enhancements made to the web site to include a Town project list and status (including New Town Hall renderings and status, pathways map and status, new pathway construction, road maintenance plans, undergrounding utilities plans, on-going sewer projects, etc.), as well as added links and updates to many of the web site pages.

EDITOR'S MESSAGE

Now's the Time to Plant Pumpkins



Pumpkin lore started when an Irishman named Jack made a deal with the devil that went sour, and his soul was doomed to wander the earth forever. Jack's only light came from a lantern he made from a hollowed-out turnip.

In Ireland, a tradition started where people would dress up in costumes, leave treats, and carve turnip lanterns to both appease and scare away wandering spirits on All Hallow's Eve. The Irish who came to America realized it was easier to carve a lantern from a pumpkin than a turnip and the familiar Jack O' Lantern was born.

Vince Zunino, our local urban gardener grows prize-winning pumpkins every year. He has found that Los Altos Hills has a great climate for producing big pumpkins and he has grown some of the largest pumpkin in California.

Growing your own pumpkins can be an enjoyable pastime and is great fun for the kids watching them grow. Now is a good time to plant pumpkins for harvest before Halloween.

Make Room For Them

Pumpkins need lots of room to grow. A patch of at least 200 square feet is required for most varieties. Pumpkins require about 120 frost-free days to mature. Early June is generally the best time to plant. The pumpkins will be ready to harvest in October before Halloween. When removing the fruit from the vine, take care that the stems don't break, because they serve as protective stoppers against fungi and bacteria entering the fruit.

If you have the space, and want to grow one of the biggest pumpkins in your neighborhood some good jumbo varieties are "Atlantic Giant" or "Prizewinner." You should prepare a patch of at least 400 square feet per plant to grow a *really* big one! Plant in rich soil and amend with plenty of compost. Allow the plant to set three fruits and then remove two, leaving the best to grow to maximum size.

NEW REMOTE AUTOMATED WEATHER STATION (RAWS)



The Town of Los Altos Hills is situated in an area covered with flammable vegetation. During the summer and fall months the potential exists for a devastating wild land fire with a high probability that numerous structures would be destroyed. These destructive fires typically occur when the weather is hot, dry, and windy.

To react quickly and appropriately to these weather patterns the Santa Clara County Fire Department (SCCFD) has placed a Remote Automated Weather Station (RAW) in the hills above Foothill College.

The RAWS is solar powered and collects data automatically every hour. This data is then transmitted into the National Weather Information Management System (WIMS) and to the Santa Clara County Fire Department. This data includes temperature, fuel moisture, wind direction and speed, relative humidity, fuel temperature, rain and solar radiation. This RAWS data is then processed through the National Fire Danger Rating System (NFDRS) computer program. This program calculates and produces indexes that indicate expected fire behavior and control problems. These indexes are sent to the dispatch center at all district station 5 times daily.

The SCCFD uses these indexes to increase response to wild land fire during peak ignition and burning periods. The indexes are also used to augment staffing levels during critical fire weather patterns. The SCCFD is currently using the "Burn Index" to determine the response level it initially dispatches to wild land fires. The "Burn Index" is an open-ended number, which is directly related to the contribution of fire behavior to the effort of containing a fire. This index usually starts low in the morning hours, increases through mid day and typically peaks between 1500 and 1600 hours. This allows the dispatch level to increase as the potential for severe fire behavior increases. The current initial attached dispatch levels are:

BURN INDEX

0-29	LOW:	(1) Engine
30-59	MEDIUM	(2) Engines, (1) Four wheel drive Patrol, (1) Battalion Chief
60+	HIGH	(4) Engines, (2) Four wheel drive Patrols, (2) Battalion Chiefs

The following additional SCC Fire resources can be dispatched simultaneously with above response, or at anytime during the event prior to requesting mutual aid. The ability to receive accurate, up to date weather information greatly enhances the SCCFD ability to react quickly and with sufficient resources to aggressively attack wild land/urban interface fires in the initial stages.
