After serving continuously for 45 years as a Director of the Purissima Hills Water District Board, Robert Buss, Ph.D. is retiring on December 13th. Upon learning of Bob's retirement, Ernie Solomon, President of the Board of Directors stated, "We shall certainly miss his knowledge, sense of District and of the Town history, and his sharp wit at our meetings. We are all grateful for his dedication to ensuring that the Town's water supply is the very best - that is the legacy that he leaves for the residents of the Hills."

Purissima Hills County Water District was formed by election March 27, 1955. (The "county" was subsequently dropped from the title after state legislation permitted.) Based on his engineering expertise and hands-on management of the local Gerth Lane Mutual Water Company, Dr. Buss was one of the original founders of the Water District.

Dr. Buss was born in Provo, Utah in 1913. His father, subsequently a professor of Natural Science at San Jose State College, moved to Palo Alto when Bob was a 4th grader. He attended the old Mayfield School at El Camino Real and Page Mill Road. (Now a possible site for the Jewish Community Center.)

Edwin Gerth, whose develop-
ments occasioned later standards in the hills,
subdivided the acreage for the Buss home at the
top of Gerth Lane off Page Mill Road. At the
time, friends thought they were crazy to pay
\$5,000 per acre for bare land! But they loved
the magnificent giant oak tree (where they
constructed a wonderful tree house, now
however, in need of new floor) and the lovely
southwestern views of hills and the valley
peeking out below. Even though they depended
on well water, Bob and Eugenia built their
dream home on this lovely acre.

Bob later attended San Jose State as an under-
graduate and then went to Stanford and received his
Ph.D. in Electrical Engineering in 1940. During
WWII he worked as a civilian for the US Navy at
Alameda and for the Harvard Radio Research
Laboratory in Cambridge, MA in the area of radar
and radio countermeasures. As part of this effort, he
served at HQ, 15th Air Force Division in Bari, Italy
evaluating effectiveness of the radar counter mea-
sures. Following a five-year faculty post at North-
western University, he returned to Stanford where he
became a professor of Electrical Engineering.

Because of Bob's engineering background
and his skills at maintaining the mutual water
supply for ten family residences on Gerth Lane,
he became intimately involved with the

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PUBLIC WORKS IN THE HILLS

Construction was completed this summer on the Purissima Road Pathway Project. The pathway is on the east side of Purissima Road from Robleda Road to Conception Road. The Town used several new concepts on this pathway construction in order to make the pathway as usable as possible for the handicapped.

Work started in September on this year's Pavement Management Project. This Project will reconstruct Elena Road, including storm drain improvements and a full-length pathway from

PUBLIC HEARING FOR ORDINANCE AND ZONING CHANGES FOR CONSTRAINED LOTS

On Thursday, January 4, 2001, at approximately 7:00 p.m., the City Council will consider the following revisions to the Zoning and Site Development Ordinance:

STANDARDS FOR "CONSTRAINED" LOTS. A proposed ordinance to revise development standards for

Robleda Road to Purissima Road. The work should to be completed by the end of the year, weather permitting. A new stabilized base material is going to be used to construct the pathway. This material should make the pathways more durable and require less maintenance.

The City Council was presented a study this summer recommending how sanitary sewers could serve the entire Town. With the cooperation and energy of many Town residents, this program is proceeding. Several sanitary sewer main line extension projects have been and are in the process of being constructed.

A street striping and pavement markings project was recently completed. Each spring the Town surveys and determines the condition of street stripes and pavement markings, and contracts for the reapplication of these items where needed. Thermoplastic, a thick plastic material is used instead of paint in school areas and in areas of high traffic. Thermoplastic, while more expensive, is much longer wearing.

As the end of the fall season approaches, the Town has completed the mowing of Town owned lands. The Town mows instead of discs in order to minimize soil erosion. The Fire Department has suggested that grass be kept less then 6" high. In many areas, this has required several passes over the spring and summer.

The Public Works Department has started yearly inspection and clean up of public storm drains and watercourses in preparation for this winter. Sand bags and sand will again be available for residents' needs at the Little League parking lot adjacent to the Public Works Barn on Purissima Road.

constrained lots. These lots are parcels which, due to their small size and/or steep slopes, currently are limited to a Maximum Floor Area (MFA) of 4,000 square feet and a Maximum Development Area (MDA) of 5,000 square feet. Another category of restricted lot is a conditional development permit lot, which has a lot unit factor of less than 0.50. Conditional development permit lots are generally even more limited than other constrained lots, and typically require variances to determine allowable development on the site.

The proposed ordinance would modify the Town's existing standards by:

- Increasing the allowable development area on constrained lots to 6,500 square feet (rather than 5,000);
- Determining the allowable floor area on conditional development permit lots based on a formula which relates the lot unit factor to the 4,000 square foot limit, without requiring a variance;
- Determining the allowable development area on conditional development permit lots based on the allowable floor area plus 2,100 square feet, without requiring a variance.

The Town's Planning Commission has recommended the ordinance revisions and the City Council will act on the ordinance proposals subsequent to the public hearing. Copies of the draft ordinances are available from the Planning Department at Town Hall, and questions may be directed to the Department at (650) 941-7222. NEW PLANNING DIRECTOR APPOINTED

Carl Cahill, acting planning director since June 2000, was appointed planning director in mid-September 2000. Among his duties are the review of incoming home and subdivision development projects for compliance with zoning and site development codes. Additionally, Carl administers the planning and building departments and serves as staff to the planning commission.

Carl replaces the former planning director, Curtis Williams who left in June.

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planning for adequate water in LOS ALTOS HILLS. However, Bob states, "Even then, residents of the Hills worried about growth issues. The late-comers to the Hills felt that if piped water was brought in, it might encourage more people to live here and change the rural ambience."

The election on March 29, 1955 formed a county water district: allowed it to issue bonds to provide the financing; and elected an original 5-member board of directors. The original board members were: Carol C. Fortriede, (Chairman); Robert R. Buss, (Vice Chairman); Leonard Burkhardt; William C. Neal; George Ditz, Jr. Louise Fortriede agreed to serve as the initial secretary.

At the first organization meeting, John P. Whitney was appointed attorney for the district, and the Clyde C. Kennedy firm was appointed to provide the engineering for the system. Later, as system installation began, Col. William Hicks was hired as secretary-manager. Subsequently,

William McCann was hired to replace Col. Hicks, and Thomas Jenkins to replace John Whitney. Originally, the headquarters meetings were held at various private homes. With water available, however, pressure built to control development, leading to the incorporation of the Town of Los Altos Hills on January 27, 1956 with John Fowle as Mayor. Many of the same movers who were behind the formation of the water district worked for incorporation. The John Fowle family donated the parcel of land "for public service facilities" where the present Town Hall and Water District Headquarters now stand.

Mayor Jack Fowle offered the site to be rented to the district for \$1.00 per year, renewable at 10-year intervals. "That was an offer that the district could not refuse. So the present office was built there. Unfortunately, the third renewal date was passed unobserved, so the present "rent" is considerably more," jokingly says Bob.

Currently all district water is obtained from the San Francisco Hetch Hetchy supply line which delivers water to the Crystal Springs Reservoir by gravity flow all the way from the Sierra Nevada site of the Hetch Hetchy Dam located within Yosemite Park.

The Water District purchases the water, transmits it, and pumps it to be stored in several tanks located at strategic points generally within the Town limits. Water allocation from San Francisco's system is based on the original expected usage. However, the allocation has not increased along with development so at this time District residents are using more than allocated.

According to Dr. Buss, the politics of water revolve around population growth and quality of life issues. The bigger the houses are and the more extensive the landscaping the more water is needed. Thoughtful utilization of drought tolerant plants will make a serious contribution to conservation. The water district is currently looking toward obtaining additional water

dollar pipeline connection to the Santa Clara valley Water District at Loyola Corners. For the near term, for use in emergency situations, a trial well is being developed at Town Hall to evaluate the flow rates and water quality.

Another major issue will be the future fluoridation of the San Francisco water supply. Bob feels the "customers" should vote on this issue.

When asked about qualifications to serve on the board, Bob strongly emphasizes, "Executive and finance management skills, technical background and engineering skills, ability to ask intelligent questions. All of the board members are sincerely dedicated to community service and the public interest." They certainly are not doing the job for the compensation. Directors receive \$100 per month for their service. The members of the board are elected representatives of the residents within the district, but an election is held only when there are more candidates than vacancies. Otherwise, after certification by the Registrar of Voters, the Board of Supervisors formally appoints to fill vacancies on the board. This year since only three candidates applied for the three slots, all have been certified and all will be appointed. Dan Seidel, long time Los Altos Hills resident, and former member of the Board of Directors has been newly appointed to replace Bob. Present board members Jan Fenwick and Ernie Solomon have been re-appointed to new terms as well.

Bob has observed many changes in the past 45 years, the biggest he states, "Growth! There are now over 2000 connections. In the beginning, there was only a single storage pressure zone, now there are three. There is, however, need for increased storage capacity for use in case of emergency."

Los Altos Hills has been the beneficiary of Bob's remarkable knowledge, skills and abilities for over 45 years. "I will miss Dr. Buss's wisdom, good judgment, and particularly his amazing memory regarding district details back to the 50's! (Not to mention his jokes!)," says Jan Fenwick, Former President of the Board of Directors.

We are fortunate indeed that he will remain available as a resource to the water district and he promises to attend a few meetings as time allows – but we also hope that he finds time to replace the floor in that favorite tree house. No doubt he will!

Thank you, Bob for your outstanding contributions to the Purissima Hills Water District and the Town of Los Altos Hills.

TOWN HISTORY PATHWAY WALK

Historical Contributions from Malcolm Clark and Les Earnest

The Town of Los Altos Hills is a treasure chest of historical interest. We have Ohlone Indian Sites near O'Keefe and El Monte area, houses for famous actors, farmers, and summer homes for wealthy San Franciscans.

One of the best ways to learn about this Town's history and explore it is to set out on foot on the Los Altos Hills pathway system. A number of these sites can be seen on a fairly level 2.5-mile walk or bike ride utilizing a combination of on-road and off-road pathway segments.

Start at the Bullis School (25890 Fremont Road), turn left out of the parking lot and continue on Fremont until the first stop sign, and turn right onto Manuella Road. About 1 block down is Mulberry Road where the Gardner Bullis house (14085 Mulberry Road), built in 1870, is located. He was Town's first attorney and donated the land for the nearby Bullis Elementary School.

Continue down Manuella Road and turn left on Altadena Road and then right onto Kingsley Drive. On your LAH pathway map for this location, you will see some 30 plus very tiny "picnic" lots defined, only 30 X 112 feet in size. These lots were originally for sale in 1913 as "picnic lots" where owners would drive down from San Francisco or take the train and have a picnic on their own land. More recently, neighboring homeowners have consolidated 13 to 14 of these small lots into building sites. Many houses elsewhere in LAH were also originally constructed for vacation purposes, as small summer cabins, or hunting lodges.

At the end of Kingsley Drive, turn left into Esther Clark Park. This park was deeded to the City of Palo Alto in 1975 by pioneer pediatrician Dr. Esther Clark, who grew up on the Stanford Campus and lived after 1932 near the northwest end of the park. She bought the land in 1946 from her neighbors, Ruolf and Gerda Eisenberg

In the late 1920's, Ruolf and Gerta Eisenberg had an airstrip and hanger for their light aircraft in what is now Esther Clark Park.

Continue across Esther Clark Park all the way to Old Trace Lane and turn left on Old Trace Lane.



Take Old Trace to Fremont Road and turn left. Continue on Fremont Road until just past Palo Hills Drive and take the off-road pathway connector on your right to Ortega Drive. At Ortega, jog right and cross the street to another off-road path that will take you behind Pinewood School. This nice creek side path is great for catching frogs and tadpoles at the right time of the year.

Explore pathways in Los Altos Hills with your children.

Continue on this path until it returns to Fremont Road and turn right onto Fremont. At 26379 Fremont Road is the Town's first and current Town Hall built in 1956 by Town volunteers. The small historical house that houses part of the Town Staff, the Sheriff station and LAH history room at the Town Hall site was originally located in downtown Los Altos and was moved to this site in mid 1980.

There are historic artifacts and historical farming equipment on display at Town Hall.

Continue and bear left on Fremont Road past Town Hall back toward Bullis School. At La Paloma Road, turn right and continue on La Paloma and turn left on Todd Lane. Go up Todd lane and take the off-road path down toward Bullis School. Once you reach Bullis school property, take the path to the right to meet up with the path that connects to Campo Vista.

At the corner of Campo Vista and Fremont Road is the Dr C.C. Crane residence built in 1926 which was also the childhood home of retired Senator Alan Cranston.

Turn left onto Fremont to return back to the Bullis School parking lot.
