## To Underground Or Not To Underground

*That Is The Question*

**F**ew Los Altos Hills residents love the 50 or so miles of unsightly, dangerous utility wires and poles that mar our Town. (As recently as October 2002 a fire was started in Town by downed power wires!)

However, years of study by Town committees and Council have not

resulted in elimination of these wires...or even an accepted plan for such a project.

However, help may be on the way. The community has spoken loud and clear about their interest in saving Open Space and maintaining our rural ambience. There is no question that residents want to preserve the beauty of our landscape.

No matter how we look at the problem, it basically boils down to money and the energy to deal with the problem on the part of our residents.

On the down side, some view the cost as prohibitive. At around \$15,000 to \$20,000 per home, many residents are not willing to spend their money on the project — and especially those residents who live on fixed incomes or on streets that are already undergrounded.

The \$15,000 to \$20,000 is the amount to bring the wires to the property line; however, many more homes in Town have the wires underground between the street and the home than on their street or at edge of a lot.

The cost estimate applies to any home not having undergrounding at this time. In the proposal recently provided, neighborhoods not already done will pay for undergrounding. This occurs because the only neighborhoods that would apply for undergrounding would be ones that are not presently undergrounded.

### What to do?

We can look to the Town of Tiburon for guidance. Tiburon just this year completed the "Stewart Drive Undergrounding Assessment District" project, which resulted in the undergrounding of wires serving 87 homes. It took many years to complete. The homeowners paid \$15,800 each for the project, but the Town handled much of the administration, including arranging for financing for homeowners who needed it.

A proposal was previously before the LAH City Council, and will be reintroduced soon, that would create the opportunity for projects similar to the "Stewart Drive" project, but with one very significant difference, namely that our Town would pick up part the cost of the projects, say 50%, as an incentive.

Each neighborhood project would occur on a first-come-first-served basis.

### Why Not Let PG&E Do It?

While it is tempting say, "Just let PG&E and PacBe handle this problem," due to financial problems that just isn't going to happen. It appears that with prudent fiscal management, the Town can afford it

### To Be Or Not To Be?

We will soon find out whether LAH undergrounding is "to be or not to be." Will our community have the will to actually do it? In order to implement such a plan, it will take neighborhood leadership.

A new plan will be discussed and refined for presentation to the residents in the future by the new City Council. ### CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

#### *Update on SBC Pacific Bell DSL Project*

SBC Pacific Bell recently reduced their non-management workforce by 2,300 employees, the effect of which is unknown on Santa Clara County. It is our understanding that they are reducing in the areas with the least demand. The reasons given for this reduction are due to the regulatory environment and downturn in the economy. The CPUC rendered a decision in May 2002, which lowered the prices SBC can charge their competitors for access to their network.

SBC External Affairs Director has advised that they "met their commitments for DSL deployment in Los Altos Hills in 2002 and are ahead of schedule." The 2003 build schedule is unknown at this time but should be announced early in the first quarter of 2003.

#### *Town-wide Emergency Preparedness Training*

The Town's first collaborative emergency preparedness training of our residents occurred on October 2, 2002 with the assistance of the Palo Alto Chapter of the American Red Cross. Over forty citizens attended the hour and a half session with positive feedback and suggestions. The next training was attended by 32 residents and was held at Bullis School on November 12. Again, the training session received a positive response. Based on the change in composition of the audience, the Bullis program was more focused on family preparedness and child safety in the event of a disaster. Fliers were sent to homes via the students and the Town's emergency email database was used to promote the second session.

There will be future Emergency Preparedness training sessions for the residents.

#### *Update on County-wide Radio/Data Interoperability Project*

The Communications Steering Committee for this very important project recently reported on its status to the Santa Clara County City/County Managers Association. Specifically, the Committee has recommended securing the services of a full-time Project Manager/Systems Integrator to move this project forward at this critical juncture. Attempting to make further progress using in-house staff as a collateral assignment is not workable due to competing priorities. Contractual assistance can be funded within the project's current budget. The "black box" solution to radio interoperability has been rethought in favor of using an approach which combines some patches to our existing systems in the County with some operational guideline changes. Some project dollars may be spent to enhance existing radio equipment to improve current systems and maximize interoperable communications.

#### *Appointment of New City Clerk*

Effective November 4, 2002, Karen Jost joined the Town Staff as City Clerk replacing Pat Dowd, who retired after 23 years of service to Los Altos Hills.

### POLLUTION PREVENTION KEEPS OUR LOCAL CREEKS AND WETLANDS HEALTHY

A watershed is a land area that drains into a creek, river, lake, wetland, bay, or groundwater aquifer. In Santa Clara Valley, all the water from rain and irrigation which flows over the land surface (called runoff) goes into storm drains, creeks and rivers that flow directly to San Francisco Bay.

Here are easy ways to prevent watershed pollution:

1. Control erosion around your property to prevent dirt and debris from being carried into the storm drain. Erosion is the washing away of soil by rain in the rainy season.
  2. Find some alternative ways to control pests inside and outside your home, without toxic chemical pesticides. If you do use pesticides, use them sparingly and according to the directions specified on the container. Do not use outside if rain is forecast within 24 hours. Take unwanted pesticides to a Household Hazardous Waste Collection Event.
  3. If you change your own oil, recycle the waste oil at the curb or take it to a Household Hazardous Waste Collection Event. Regularly maintain your car to avoid leaks of auto fluids. Never pour oil or other automotive fluids into a storm drain or onto the ground.
  4. Clean up trash outside your home. Pick up leaves and yard clippings and recycle as green waste. If you see litter, pick it up and put it in a trash can.
  5. Wash your car on an unpaved area or better yet, take it to a commercial car wash.
  6. Pick up your pet droppings and dispose of them in the trash or in your toilet.
  7. Use kitty litter or other absorbent materials - not your hose - to clean up spills and leaks on paved surfaces. Remember to clean up and properly dispose of the used absorbent.
  8. Rinse latex paint brushes, pans and rollers in the sink. Filter and reuse oil-based paint thinner or brush cleaners. Take leftover latex and oil-based paints and solvents to a hazardous waste collection event. Never pour paint or solvents into storm drain, sink or onto the ground.
  9. Divert rainspouts and garden hoses away from paved surface to prevent water from carrying pollutants directly into storm drains. Provide landscaping next to sidewalks and driveways to collect runoff from paved surfaces.
- By protecting the watershed, creeks and the Bay, we are protecting the environment for our children and future generations.

## PLANNING DIRECTOR'S REPORT

**T**own Planning Department approvals for new development since August 2002 through November 2002, include the following: five new residences approved through the Fast Track review process, six secondary units, two additions, four pools and three landscape screening plans. The Planning Commission reviewed the following: four new single family residences, three subdivisions of land, one conditional use permit, two variance requests, two lot line adjustments, one landscape plan, one new driveway. The Planning Commission voted to recommend that the City Council approve the 2002 Master Path Plan. The Commission also revoked a previously approved variance and site development permit in response to the unauthorized demolition of an existing home. In the coming weeks, the Planning Commission will begin studying ways to reduce the incidence of tall or dense vegetation blocking views on surrounding properties.

Back in early September, a Secondary Housing Unit Survey was distributed to Town residents as part of the 2002 Housing Element update. This survey was last conducted in 1994. The survey helps document the effectiveness of the Town's secondary housing unit program in meeting the Town's regional share of affordable housing needs. As of November 1, 2002, the Planning Department has received over 1,200 returned surveys. We wish to thank all those who took their time to complete the survey. The survey results will be tabulated and incorporated into the revised Housing Element and sent to the California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) for review.

Town Staff has received introductory training on the Standardized Emergency Management System (SEMS) with training on the use of the Town's Emergency Operations Center (EOC) to follow. Terry Gitlan, Director of Emergency Services for Santa Clara County, will provide Town staff with tabletop exercises following EOC training. The City Manager wishes to maintain a consistent training schedule to ensure Town staff is well prepared in the event of a disaster.

## Welcome to Our New City Clerk

**I**f getting organized is the hallmark of a great city clerk, then Karen Jost is destined for great success as Los Altos Hills' new city clerk. In her first few weeks of service, she has already organized a successful recognition dinner for her predecessor for 104 people, administered the November 5th election, and received the Citizens' Open Space Initiative that must be delivered in a timely manner to the County Registrar of Voters.

Karen, a long time valley resident who lives in the unincorporated area of Los Altos Hills, assumed the almost impossible task of replacing highly admired and respected former city clerk, Pat Dowd. Pat recently retired after 23 years of service.

The role of the city clerk is central to the conduct of Municipal Government. They are *highly* visible and yet must be neutral in a *highly* political environment. The city clerk's role is dictated by the State of California, city charters and by local law. Karen is responsible in part for maintaining the legislative history of the Town. (That means actions taken at the council meetings by elected officials.) Additional responsibilities include conducting municipal elections, processing initiatives, referendums, recall petitions and to perform recruitment for board and commission members. In addition, city clerks are legal publications, records and Brown Act experts.

Karen grew up in the Willow Glen area of San Jose and attended San Jose State University, majoring in the Social Sciences. In the past 30 years she has combined raising a family with volunteer services by serving on the West Valley Paralegal Advisory Board and for the past 9 years served as Fire Commissioner for the Los Altos Hills County Fire District representing the unincorporated area of Los Altos Hills.

Karen's past experience includes being an entrepreneur - starting Windfall Associates, a public relations firm that she ran for 10 years. Prior to applying for the position of City Clerk, Karen enjoyed broad past experience in working in different departments in LAH Town Hall - for example, substituting in the LAH Planning Department when Lani Smith was on extended leave, working as an assistant to the Public Works Director and Office Manager. The experience provided great background of Town systems and policies. Nonetheless, Karen states, "My biggest challenge is trying to acquire all of the knowledge and history that Pat Dowd gained in her many years of service to the Town."

Judging by how efficiently Karen handled her first big challenge of receiving the Citizen's Open Space Initiative with over 1240 residents' signatures - there is little doubt that Karen will rise to the level our great city clerk of the past. Please join us in extending a warm welcome to Karen.

#### **A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF LOS ALTOS HILLS IN SUPPORT OF THE CONTINUED OPERATION OF BULLIS-PURISSIMA ELEMENTARY SCHOOL IN LOS ALTOS HILLS**

**WHEREAS**, the Town of Los Altos Hills considers the Bullis-Purissima Elementary School a priceless asset and treasure of the community of Los Altos Hills; and

**WHEREAS**, the Los Altos School District maintains only one public school serving K-6 school children residing in the Town of Los Altos Hills; and
