## WESTWIND BARN STATUS

**S**ituated deep in the heart of Los Altos Hills adjacent to some of our most beautiful open spaces is a real crown jewel of our community. As you proceed northward along Altamont Road, you pass some of the most beautiful scenery in Town, with the Byrne Preserve to your left and Bay views on the right. Often, you can see horses graze on the Preserve as the fog lingers in the morning. Just past the Preserve is our Town-owned Westwind Barn.

Westwind Barn and the adjoining property have been owned by Los Altos Hills since 1975. This property came into public ownership as the result of a generous gift from Countess Margit Besseyeney of Hamilton, Montana and a companion purchase by the Town. One and one-half years after acquiring the property, the Town leased the facilities to a private organization, Friends of Westwind. The Friends have managed the facility every since. Recently, a second organization, Supporters of Westwind, was created, primarily as a group dedicated to raising money for the renovation of the Barn. Among other things, Supporters of Westwind sponsors the popular annual Derby Day event and celebration.



Keeping in mind the importance of this community asset, the Los Altos Hills City Council has taken on the issue of planning the future of Westwind Barn. The council's desire is to secure future availability of the barn to all residents of our community. In addition to preservation and restoration, the Council is also committed to enabling more Parks and Recreation programs and events at the barn.

The Council has hired a consultant to inspect the facility and report back on its structural integrity and to give preliminary estimates of the cost of renovation. Concurrent with this review, the Council has created two Ad Hoc Committees to provide advice to the Council. The first is a committee addressing governance of the barn. This committee is charged with providing advice as to the proposed legal structure of Barn governance, including developing a strategy to access park bond funds, other Town funds and/or private donations. This committee is expected to report its final recommendations by March. The second committee will then begin its work. It is charged with planning the renovation of the Barn and the expanded uses of the Barn. The Town ordered consultant report on the Barn's condition will be an important input into the committee's deliberations.

The Council got actively involved because of the increased community interest in the Barn, greater demand for recreational equestrian activities by our residents and in response to the pressing need to renovate the Barn. The goal is to ensure that this valuable Town asset continues to be available to the increasing number of Town residents who want to participate in the many activities at the barn.

### ***CITY MANAGER - Recent Resignation***

The Town has launched a search for the position of City Manager after the resignation of former manager Maureen Cassingham. The Council thanks Ms. Cassingham for her five years of service to our Town. An ad hoc subcommittee of the Council has been created and it is expected the Council will hire a search firm specializing in City Manager searches. On average, it takes approximately 4-6 months to complete a City Manager search. Carl Cahill has accepted the position of Acting City Manager in the interim. The City Council is seeking input from Town residents as to the characteristics we should seek in our next City Manager.

## JAN FENWICK LOS ALTAN OF THE YEAR

The Los Altos Town Crier staff selected Jan Fenwick as the Los Altan of the Year - as a model of leadership and generosity. Jan is known as a goodwill ambassador throughout the community.

Jan has resided in LAH since 1987 and served 12 years as a Director of the Purissima Hills Water District.

## LOS ALTOS HILLS GOES SINGLE-STREAM RECYCLING

Los Altos Garbage Co. has provided encouraging statistics on increased recovery of recyclables when communities go to single-stream recycling, which allows the residents to commingle their paper and glass recyclables. Commingling recyclables may seem counter-intuitive but by making it easier for residents to recycle, single-stream recycling programs show a net increase in recycling material. BFT's state of the art reprocessing plant at Newby Island, Milpitas can only recover about 90% of the material collected by using single-stream recycling, a 5% decrease from the older non-commingling collection methods. However, single stream recycling increases the tonnage of recyclables recovered by residents by about 20 - 30%, therefore resulting in an overall increased tonnage recycled. The biggest problems are fibrous or stringy waste, shredded paper from paper shredders, Styrofoam "peanuts," clamshell-packing material, plastic bags, and plastics other than those marked #1 - #7. These waste products either cannot be separated out effectively, jam up the automated recycling process or cannot be used in recycling. (Plastic bags can be recycled if placed in single clear bags and secured so individual bags don't get out and gum up the mechanical separators.)

Los Altos Hills residents currently recycle about 60% of their total refuse, which is above the average of about 50% for the state. Single stream recycling should help residents to increase this and make Los Altos Hills a notable standout community for recycling.

## Tragic Death of Cyclist During Storm

On January 1, 2006 during the height of a rain and windstorm a huge Eucalyptus tree was uprooted and a branch fell onto a passing bicyclist, Daniel Plummer who was instantly killed. The event occurred on Natoma Road near the intersection of Black Mountain Road.

Plummer was a 39-year-old research scientist and a member of the Team Spine, a Northern California amateur road racing team. His riding partner, Eric Saltzman was riding ahead of Plummer when the accident occurred.

Funeral services were conducted in Plummer's hometown of Walpole, Massachusetts during the week of January 2nd.

### City Takes Action on Eucalyptus Trees

Many roads in the Hills were blocked as a result of fallen trees.

The city council is taking action to assess the current vulnerable trees in the Hills and to look at developing further action plan for managing Eucalyptus trees.

## Open Space Committee WILDLIFE SURVEY

More than 380 LAH residents returned the wildlife survey sent out in December by the Open Space Committee. More than half of respondents volunteered additional detailed information about wildlife they see in their neighborhood. "We were thrilled by the level of interest and thoughtfulness that people showed in their responses," says Roger Spreen, Committee Chair.

The survey asked residents how often they see deer, coyote, bobcats and foxes, primary users of wildlife corridors in LAH. Deer are seen daily by 80% of respondents who live west of Interstate 280 and 17% who live east of 280. Sightings of coyotes, bobcats, and foxes are rare on both sides, although two-thirds of respondents have seen them at least once. A summary will be published on the Town web site.

The survey is part of the Wildlife Corridor project to identify significant wildlife corridors in the Town, and the information provided by residents will help the ecology consultants (Live Oak Associates) hired by the Town to validate their fieldwork and mapping. Thanks to everyone who sent in a survey!

## PLANNING DIRECTOR'S REPORT

### A Creekwise Approach

There are six creeks within the Town of Los Altos Hills and these creeks border along many residential properties. Make the most of your location next to a creek by helping to keep it healthy.

### Use creekwise gardening and landscaping practices

- Never dispose of lawn clippings in a creek or on a creek bank. Soil and lawn clippings disposed in creeks become unsightly, destroy aquatic habitats, and cause diseases in trees.

### Take invasive species out - put local native species in

- Native plants and trees, which specialize in growing within a creek corridor, provide important habitat value unlike many exotic plants.

### Pave only when necessary

- If you are planning to construct walkways, patios, driveways, or storm water drains, consider alternatives with permeable surfaces to allow more rainwater to soak into the ground.

### Build away from the creek

- Avoid locating structures such as decks, patios and storage sheds near the creek bank. (The Town of Los Altos Hills requires all structures including patios and decks to be setback at least 25-feet from the top of the creek bank)

### Check for erosion regularly and correct problems promptly

- Be sure to seek professional advice and a permit from the water district before taking action. A Site Development Permit from the Town is also required for most projects undertaken near creeks.

## LAH County Fire District FREE BRUSH CHIPPING PROGRAM

*(Your tax dollars working for you!)*

The Los Altos Hills County Fire District is offering all residents a free service of chipping and disposal of brush and prunings. This program has been very successful.

The Town has been divided into 6 separate areas. Starting in late February through May, each designated area of the Town will be notified of the service by a letter containing a postcard to return informing the contractor of your request to have the service.

Here is how it works: During the spring and early summer the District's contractor will be in your neighborhood available to chip brush and tree prunings that you have cut and stacked on your property. Chips will be left with you or the contractor will take them. If you want the free service, you will need to plan to do your pruning and make an appointment with the contractor.

The Fire District encourages you to take advantage of this free assistance to make your home more defensible against a wildland fire.

- All flammable vegetation should be cleared a minimum of 30 feet around structures.
- Tree limbs should be cut within 10 feet of chimneys.
- Trees that are 18 feet or taller should be limbed 6 feet above the ground.

The Fire District contractor is S. P. McClenahan Co. They will perform the service during the spring and early summer. **Remember, the postcard must be returned to the S.P. McClenahan Co. for this service to be scheduled.** The contractor will call to schedule an appointment with you for the brush chipping service.

The LAH County Fire District services are provided by the Santa Clara County Fire Department.

The Town Picnic will continue the celebration of the Town's Fiftieth Anniversary. Over 1,300 Town residents attended the Picnic last year, and more are expected this year.

The Town Picnic is organized by the Community Relations Committee, with help from many other

Our Town hosts the Picnic as the major annual community event that brings together all of our Town residents. Since there is no charge for attending, the picnic is limited to Los Altos Hills residents and Town staff — so do encourage your Los Altos Hills neighbors to attend with you, but please do not invite friends from other cities. Also, by city ordinance, dogs are not allowed on the fields, so please leave Fido at home.

A registration coupon will be mailed to all Town residents in May, and advance registration by Monday, May 22nd is required so the appropriate number of meals may be ordered. Many large canopies will be provided, so rain or hot weather does not cancel the picnic.

### Music Training Enriches Public Schools

The sound of music echoes through our public schools, thanks to programs supported by the generosity of Hills residents and parents.

Music education starts in Kindergarten. The Bullis-Purissima Extended Day Kindergarteners use some of the "extra" time afforded by the longer program for singing.

Older children have music appreciation once a week. Formal music training starts in fourth grade, when every child in the Los Altos School District learns to play the recorder and to read music.

In fifth and sixth grade, children select an instrument and join a band or orchestra. All this is

funded by parent contributions to the PTA and the Los Altos Education Foundation (LAEF).

Extra-curricular music opportunities abound. Covington School offers two choral groups, the Daybreakers — named for their 7:45 AM rehearsal time - and the new Coyote Chorus.

"Music helps children with concentration, math, fine motor skills, and gives them a lifetime of enjoyment," said Ann Wolff, Covington PTA co-president. "We are fortunate that our schools' basic needs are taken care of by residents' generous parcel tax, so that PTA and LAEF contributions can go towards enrichment offerings like music."

**BUDGET FOR FISCAL YEAR 2006 - 2007**

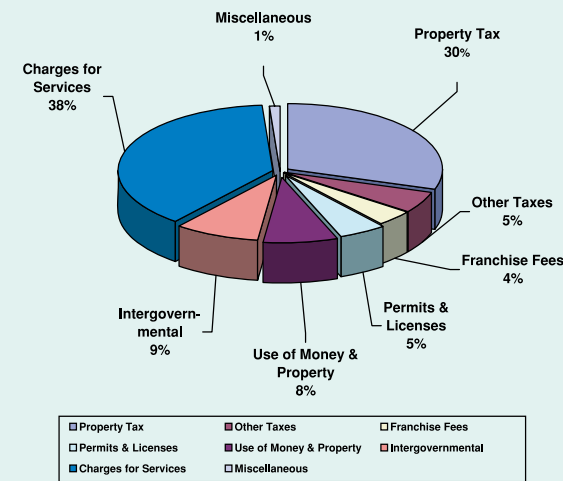
The Town's priorities for the year are to provide timely and quality services to residents and to preserve infrastructure assets. The budget presented in this document is our plan for meeting Town priorities within our fiscal constraints.

This proposed budget has been prepared in accordance with the following principles:

- Prioritize Town infrastructure needs to make the best use of scarce resources
  - Use reserves, new revenues and reductions to fund a balanced, sustainable budget
  - Evaluate new ways to do business to improve services and reduce costs
- Some key assumptions and projections used in the preparation of this budget are as follows:
- Secured property tax projected to increase by 7.8%
  - Full-time employee staffing remains at 21; salaries will be adjusted by a 2.9% CPI increase
  - An appropriation in the amount of \$178,000 has been included to fund post-employment health benefits
  - Capital improvement projects: budget is \$3.289 million - an increase of \$648 thousand over the prior year; the cost will be offset by outside funding in the amount of \$692 thousand
  - Other planned projects include replacement of accounting software (\$37K), general plan update (\$50K), annexation processing (\$20K), Council elections (\$27K), urban forest management (\$75K), replacement of code enforcement vehicle (\$35K); traffic study (\$30K)
  - Expenditures exceed revenues for the year by \$1,837,810 - this excess is the amount being spent out of reserves for capital projects
  - Our reserves remain at a satisfactory level and our Town is in healthy financial shape

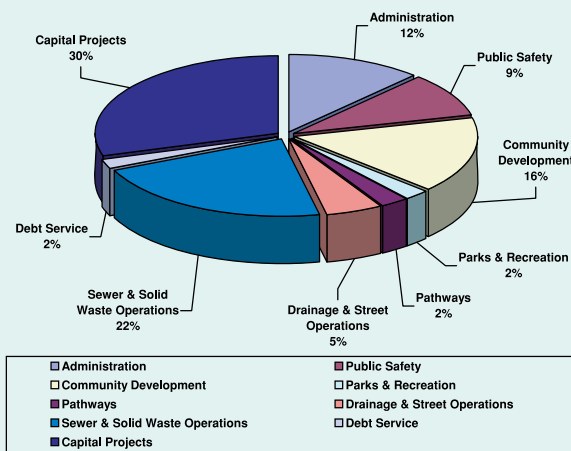
Our goal is to provide the high level of service the community expects within the revenues we have available. We will continue to investigate opportunities for revenue growth and cost containment aimed at providing a balanced budget that will accommodate maintenance of facilities, appropriate staffing levels and funding for future capital projects.

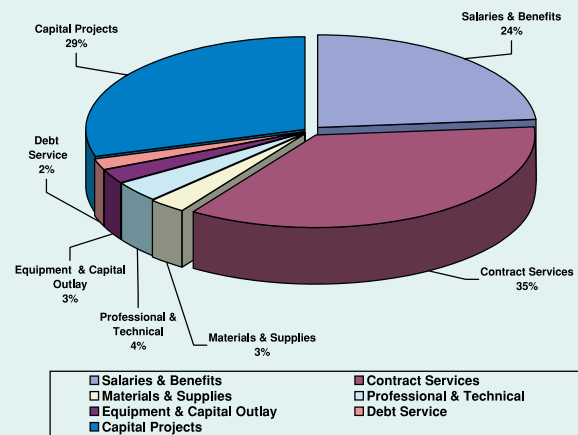

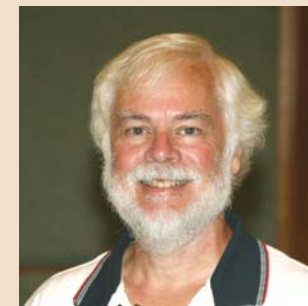

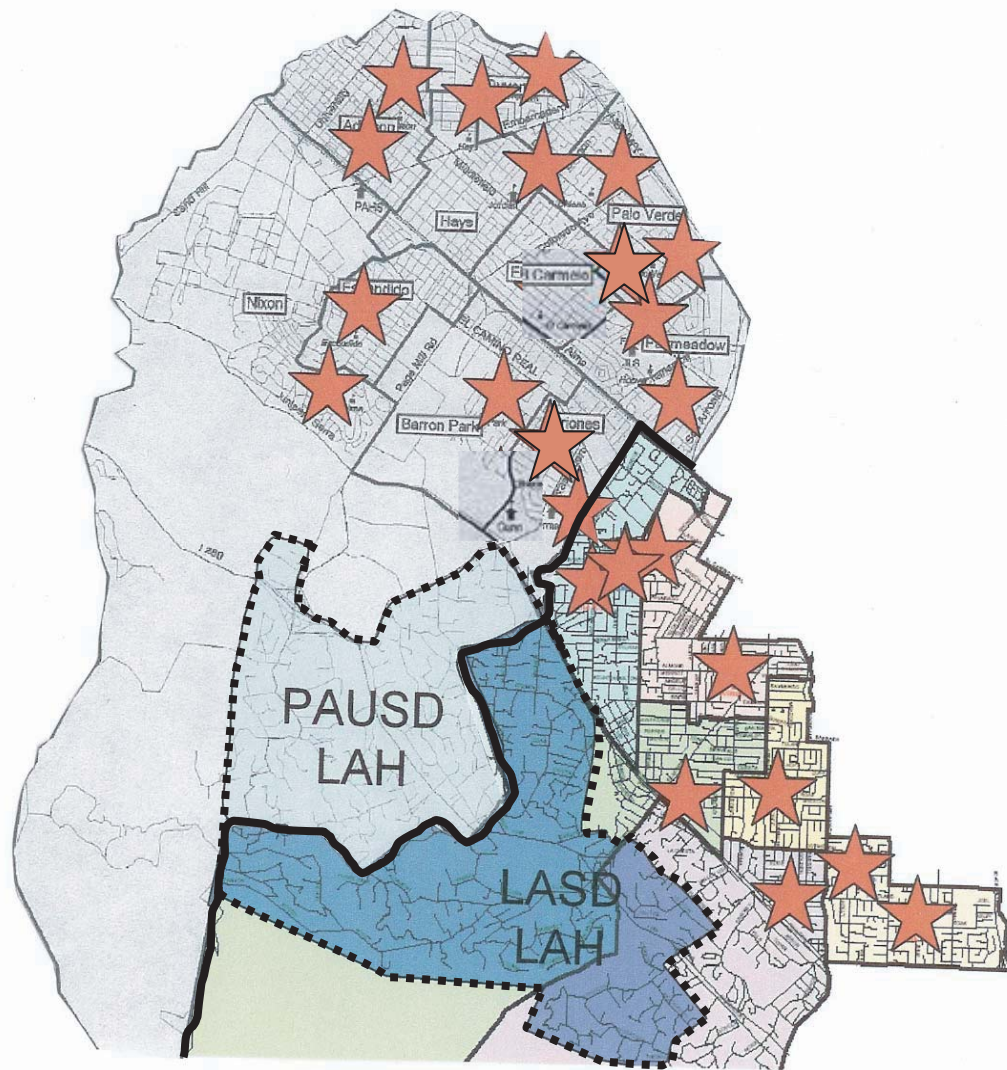
