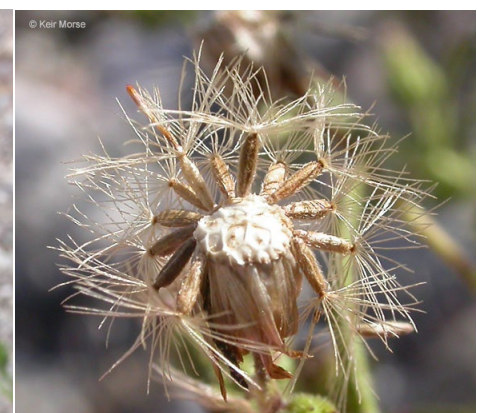




Help us stop the spread of Stinkwort

This non-native, noxious, flammable plant is spreading rapidly in our town, and we need all hands to stop the spread and to help preserve and protect our local species.

Stinkwort thrives in disturbed areas and is most commonly found along roadsides. It has also invaded open riparian areas, flood plains, pond/lake margins, seasonal wetlands, and overgrazed pastures

How can you help?

2. Stinkwort is a sticky, camphor-smelling plant and handling it can cause a rash. Put on your gloves and pull or cut now before it starts to flower around Sept 21. Before Sept 21 you can leave cut weeds in place to decompose or place in green bin. After Sept 21 place cut plants in green bins. Free smart phone apps iNaturalist or Seek can help you to identify the plant.
